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What is Memorize 90?

Life is full of tests and the Word of God contains the answers. Then the questions come it is important to have the answers. Memorize 90 is a tool you can use to be equipped when life puts you on the spot.

Memorize 90 (M90) is a very easy-to-use systematic Scripture memorization program developed by the Youth Ministries of the United Pentecostal Church International. It is also a personal devotion guide. Who is it for? It is for anyone who wants to memorize and apply Scripture, especially our target audience of teenagers and young adults.

How does it work? Memorize 90 verses in 90 days. 3 months. 1 verse per day.

Not just Scripture memorization, but Scripture application.

M90 is designed to help you understand the Scriptures you are memorizing so they can be applied to your life. Our prayer is that the verses will become more than just words on a page but rather words that come alive.

Personal Devotion Guide

Here are some easy steps to put M90 into action in your life as a personal devotion guide.

1. Pray before you begin each day and ask God to open your mind and heart by giving you understanding of the Scripture. Pray that God will speak to you through His Word and that His Word will become alive in you. Some days you may pray for five or ten minutes. Other days your prayer time will be much longer as you grow in your relationship with the author of each Scripture. Be sensitive to the Spirit of God and don't rush through your prayer time.
2. Review the verses you have already memorized. See review methods in the *Memorizations Methods and Tips* section.
3. Read the topic description of the passage you are memorizing.
4. Memorize your Scripture for the day. See memorization methods in the *Memorization Methods and Tips* section.
5. Use the margins of your M90 guide to write notes. What is that particular verse speaking to you? Write out why a particular topic is relevant to your life?



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6. Complete the *Apply the Scripture* section at the end of each topic when you have memorized all the verses in that section. You may need to “Google” some words used in these questions or even terms used in the Scriptures themselves. You can also use www.dictionary.com, Bible study software, or a good old-fashioned concordance and Bible dictionary. They still work.
7. Check the corresponding box (☐ Day 1) each day after you have memorized your verse and finished your personal devotion time.

Memorization Methods and Tips

Anybody can memorize. Yes, even you. If you have a brain you have the ability to memorize. You already memorize things that are important to you. It is simply a matter of priority and a commitment of time.

The human brain has an amazing capacity to store information. Through focus and repetition an immeasurable amount of data can be stored for a lifetime in the long-term memory of the brain. You have used this ability to commit to memory phone numbers, songs, poems, passwords, answers to a test, obscure facts, and the statistics of professional athletes. Much of this information is important and useful in life, while some of it is simply trivial.

But what about Scripture? What if you memorized the Word of God! This information is definitely not trivial, and far more than just useful. It is critical. It is eternal. It is alive! It is wisdom, inspiration, and encouragement.

Following are some memorization methods and tips that will help you commit Scripture to memory. Everyone’s memorization ability is unique to that individual and everyone has their own style of memorizing. However, you will discover that repetition is the key to memorizing, no matter which method you use. You do not have to do each of the following methods or try every tip. Find out what works for you and go with it. These are simply listed to assist you in your Scripture memorization journey.

- Read the verse out loud one time for every word in the verse. If there are ten words in the verse, read it ten times.
- Write the verse out by hand. Writing it out will cement the Scripture into your memory. You can write one verse out multiple times on a sheet of paper. You can also write it out on an index card with the Scripture text on one side and the Scripture reference on the other side. Create these flash cards so that you can take them with you anywhere you go to assist you with your memorization and review.



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- Record yourself reading the verse and play it back to yourself on your smartphone.
- Sing the verse. Singing the words of the verse to a melody can help you retain the Scripture. We only recommend doing this when no one else is around.
- The 15-repetition method. Break the verse down into smaller portions (phrases or sentences). Say the first phrase fifteen times without looking at the verse. Say the second phrase fifteen times. Now add the second phrase to the first phrase and say them both fifteen times without looking at the verse. Say the third phrase fifteen times and then add it to the first two and say them all fifteen times without looking. Keep doing this until you can say the entire verse fifteen times without looking. This method takes a little bit of time, but you will have no problem memorizing or recalling verses if you use this method.
- Review every day. Reviewing what you have already memorized is absolutely critical to your long-term recall of memorized Scripture. It is very important that you have someone listen to you quote the verses and make sure they correct you when you miss a word. The more accurately you memorize and review, the more likely you will be to remember these verses for the rest of your life.

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In the Beginning

Each of the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John) is as unique as the personalities of those writing them. The beauty of the Gospels is that we can read the same stories from different perspectives. John is credited as being the author of the Gospel of John, I, II & III John, as well as the Book of Revelation. John was the brother of James and the son of Zebedee (awesome name, right?). He is also widely believed to be the cousin of Jesus. John starts his Gospel differently than most of the other Gospels. Rather than beginning with the ministry or genealogy of Jesus, he begins at the very beginning of creation. Memorize these verses and discover the true identity of Jesus Christ.

Additional reading: Genesis 1, John 1, and 1 John 1.

- **Day 1** **John 1:1**
In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.
- **Day 2** **John 1:2**
The same was in the beginning with God.
- **Day 3** **John 1:3**
All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made.
- **Day 4** **John 1:4**
In him was life; and the life was the light of men.
- **Day 5** **John 1:5**
And the light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not.
- **Day 6** **John 1:9**
That was the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world.
- **Day 7** **John 1:10**
He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not.
- **Day 8** **John 1:11**
He came unto his own, and his own received him not.

John 1:14

And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth.

Apply the Scripture:

- According to the Scripture text above, who is the term “The Word” referring to?
- Light has three main functions: illumination, attraction, and exposure. How do these attributes relate to our relationship with God?
- Explain how you have experienced the “light” that comes through living for God.



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The Revelation of the Messiah

It is important to note that the apostle John (author of these books) and John the Baptist are not the same person. John the Baptist preceded the arrival of Jesus, the Messiah. When John the Baptist entered the scene, people assumed him to be Christ, the promised Messiah (Savior), but he assured them that he was merely the forerunner of the promised Christ. The following verses share the account of the first meeting of John the Baptist and Jesus. Memorize these verses and discover the Messiah.

Additional reading: John 1, Matthew 3, and Mark 1.

- **Day 10 John 1:23**
He said, I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness, Make straight the way of the Lord, as said the prophet Esaias.
- **Day 11 John 1:26**
John answered them, saying, I baptize with water: but there standeth one among you, whom ye know not
- **Day 12 John 1:27**
He it is, who coming after me is preferred before me, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose.
- **Day 13 John 1:29**
The next day John seeth Jesus coming unto him, and saith, Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world.
- **Day 14 John 1:30**
This is he of whom I said, After me cometh a man which is preferred before me: for he was before me.

Apply the Scripture:

- How do you think John the Baptist handled the fame and notoriety he encountered?
- John the Baptist was later quoted saying, "He must increase and I must decrease." What are some ways we can apply that mentality to our own lives?



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The First Miracle

John chapter 2 shares Jesus' first recorded miracle. While many more would occur, this marked His official entrance into His ministry. In biblical culture, each wedding had a feast. At this feast, attended by all the local officials, the families of the bride and groom would serve the best wine first, followed by the lesser quality stuff. This was more than a miracle involving saving face. This miracle rescued the family from certain isolation from their society because of their lack of provision. This miracle adequately illustrates the simple fact that Jesus is concerned with the things that concern us. Memorize these verses and know that we serve a miracle-working God.

Additional reading: John 2.

- **Day 15** **John 2:1**
And the third day there was a marriage in Cana of Galilee; and the mother of Jesus was there:
- **Day 16** **John 2:7**
Jesus saith unto them, Fill the waterpots with water. And they filled them up to the brim.
- **Day 17** **John 2:8**
And he saith unto them, Draw out now, and bear unto the governor of the feast. And they bare it.
- **Day 18** **John 2:9**
When the ruler of the feast had tasted the water that was made wine, and knew not whence it was: (but the servants which drew the water knew;) the governor of the feast called the bridegroom,
- **Day 19** **John 2:10**
And saith unto him, Every man at the beginning doth set forth good wine; and when men have well drunk, then that which is worse: but thou hast kept the good wine until now.

Apply the Scripture:

- Have you ever seen God perform a miracle in your life? If so, share it with someone this week.
- Why do you think many people cease to believe that miracles still happen?



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For God So Loved the World

The Pharisees were a religious sect in the days of Jesus. While steeped in a corrupt tradition of following the rules and regulations of the Old Testament, they missed the very Messiah they claimed to be looking for. Nicodemus was a Pharisee, but recognized that Jesus was the fulfillment of Messianic Prophecy. Knowing this, he came to Jesus at night to ask what he must do to be saved. When Jesus tried to explain the new birth experience, Nicodemus didn't understand as he tried to think of it literally. Jesus then laid out plainly our need for water baptism and Holy Ghost infilling. Memorize these verses and know that God loves you.

Additional reading: John 3, Acts 2, and Acts 19.

- **Day 20** **John 3:1**
There was a man of the Pharisees, named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews:
- **Day 21** **John 3:2**
The same came to Jesus by night, and said unto him, Rabbi, we know that thou art a teacher come from God: for no man can do these miracles that thou doest, except God be with him.
- **Day 22** **John 3:3**
Jesus answered and said unto him, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God.
- **Day 23** **John 3:4**
Nicodemus saith unto him, How can a man be born when he is old? can he enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born?
- **Day 24** **John 3:5**
Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God.
- **Day 25** **John 3:6**
That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit.



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- **Day 26** **John 3:14**
And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up:
- **Day 27** **John 3:15**
That whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life.
- **Day 28** **John 3:16**
For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.
- **Day 29** **John 3:17**
For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved.

Apply the Scripture:

- According to Jesus' response, to enter Heaven we must be born of water and of the Spirit. Explain what this means.
- Verse 17 states that Jesus didn't come to condemn the world, but to save it. Why do you think many people find it hard to believe that Jesus cares for them?
- The best application of this set of scriptures is to be born again of water and the Spirit personally. If you have never received the Holy Ghost (born again of the Spirit) or been baptized (born of water), talk to your Youth Pastor or Pastor for more information on this incredible experience.



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A Divine Appointment

One of the most interesting stories of the life of Jesus is recorded in John chapter 4. Jesus was in an area called Samaria, and He sat down at a well that at one time belonged to Jacob. As if the location wasn't unique enough, Jesus' interaction with the Samaritan woman at the well was of note also. The Jews and Samaritans did not socialize due to cultural differences dating back to the division of the kingdoms of Israel after the death of Solomon. The fact that Jesus was speaking to a Samaritan at all was a culture shock to the racial divisions of the day and struck right to the core of one of that culture's biggest problems. This story is also unique because we once again see Jesus' willingness to invest in the life of the individual. Memorize these verses and know that God desires a divine appointment with you

Additional reading: John 4.

- **Day 30** **John 4:7**
There cometh a woman of Samaria to draw water: Jesus saith unto her, Give me to drink.
- **Day 31** **John 4:10**
Jesus answered and said unto her, If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give me to drink; thou wouldest have asked of him, and he would have given thee living water.
- **Day 32** **John 4:14**
But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life.
- **Day 33** **John 4:22**
Ye worship ye know not what: we know what we worship: for salvation is of the Jews.
- **Day 34** **John 4:23**
But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him.
- **Day 35** **John 4:24**
God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth..



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Apply the Scripture:

- Jesus was a counter-cultural individual. If Jesus were beginning His ministry on the Earth today, what elements of society do you think He would work to remove?
- Explain what worshipping God in “Spirit and in Truth” means to you. Read other translations to discover the deeper meaning of these words.
- Take a moment today and step outside of your normal circle of friends to engage someone from a different background.



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The Freedom of Truth

The society in which we live is at odds with truth. The Word of God and the very principles this nation was founded upon are no longer considered “truth” by our culture today. With the abandonment of truth comes the chains of bondage. This section covers the importance of knowing and obeying the Word of God. It is increasingly important that we know the truth, and allow that truth to bring about freedom in our lives. Without it, we are destined for a life of bondage. Memorize these verses and discover the freedom that only truth can bring.

Additional reading: John 8.

- **Day 36** **John 8:31**
Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on him, If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed;
- **Day 37** **John 8:32**
And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.
- **Day 38** **John 8:36**
If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed.

Apply the Scripture:

- What are some ways that we can “continue in His word”?
- Share an example of a time that you feel God freed you from something.
- Are you dealing with bondage now? Study the Word of God and ask God to set you free from every area of bondage in your life.



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Lazarus Come Forth

As Jesus walked this earth healing the sick, freeing the captives, and doing the miraculous, we find that He also made personal connections and had friends as well. Some of His closest friends were the family of Lazarus, Martha, and Mary. One day, Lazarus became sick and they called for their friend, the Healer, to come and help. We won't ruin the story for you, but the miraculous happened. The beauty of this story is that it illustrates effectively the dual nature of Jesus. He was both God and man. He allowed Himself to feel all the pain that we feel, yet He was still able to show Himself as God. He is both Savior and friend, Deity and humanity. He is strong enough to heal, but human enough to understand what it means to hurt. He is a God that understands us. Memorize these verses and know that He is the resurrection!

Additional reading: John 11.

- **Day 39** **John 11:1**
Now a certain man was sick, named Lazarus, of Bethany, the town of Mary and her sister Martha.
- **Day 40** **John 11:17**
Then when Jesus came, he found that he had lain in the grave four days already.
- **Day 41** **John 11:21**
Then said Martha unto Jesus, Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died.
- **Day 42** **John 11:25**
Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live:
- **Day 43** **John 11:43**
And when he thus had spoken, he cried with a loud voice, Lazarus, come forth.
- **Day 44** **John 11:44**
And he that was dead came forth, bound hand and foot with graveclothes: and his face was bound about with a napkin. Jesus saith unto them, Loose him, and let him go.



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Apply the Scripture:

- Have you ever felt like God didn't show up on time? What was your reaction? How did the situation turn out?
- God understands what it means to feel the pain of His followers. No other religion can make that claim. Explain how this benefits us as Christians.
- Make a list of things that need God's miraculous intervention in your life. (Remember: Even if He doesn't heal it, that doesn't mean He can't resurrect it)



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The Greatest Example of a Servant

In most religions, the deity is placed on a pedestal so far above its followers that its “higher” being is unreachable and untouchable, but not so with Christianity. Our Creator became the created so He could fully understand the pain sin had caused and then rescue us from it. Jesus became more than just a man. He took that one step further and took on the role of a servant when He washed the feet of the disciples. In biblical times, the washing of the feet was done by one of the lowest servants. Due to the arid, dry, and dusty climate of the Middle East, as well as the sandals they wore, travelers would end their journey with dirty feet. The servants of the house would then wash the guests’ feet as they entered. This act of Jesus was symbolic of His lowering Himself to the status of a servant. His goal was to show His disciples, and us, that we should never feel as though we are too big, too popular, or too dignified to serve others. Memorize these verses and serve others as Jesus did.

Additional reading: John 13.

- **Day 45** **John 13:4**
He riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself.
- **Day 46** **John 13:5**
After that he poureth water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples’ feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded.
- **Day 47** **John 13:14**
If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye also ought to wash one another’s feet.
- **Day 48** **John 13:16**
Verily, verily, I say unto you, The servant is not greater than his lord; neither he that is sent greater than he that sent him..

Apply the Scripture:

- What do you think the disciples’ response was to Jesus humbling Himself as a servant?
- In what ways have you served others?
- Make a list of five things you can do this week to serve others.



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The Greatest Proof of Discipleship

Jesus is serious when it comes to loving and serving others. He plainly states that the only way people will know that we are His disciples is if we demonstrate love to one another. He commands us to love others in the same way that He has loved us. That is quite a challenge, but one that we must accept if we are to be His disciples. We can obey every other commandment in the Bible, but if we fail to love others we have no right to be called His disciple. Memorize these verses and love one another.

Additional reading: John 13, John 15, and 1 Corinthians 13.

- **Day 49** **John 13:34**
A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another.
- **Day 50** **John 13:35**
By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another.
- **Day 51** **John 15:12**
This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you.
- **Day 52** **John 15:13**
Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.

Apply the Scripture:

- Jesus instructs us to “love one another as He loved us.” What does that mean to you?
- Jesus said we will be known as His disciple by our love for one another. Why do you think that is the case?
- What are some ways that you can demonstrate the love of God this week?



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The God Who Answers Prayer

In Greek mythology, and in many cultures during biblical times, the followers of false deities were very vocal in their petitioning of their gods. To ask their god for something was not an uncommon thing. But as we know, their gods didn't really exist, and their prayers went unanswered. To ask anything of a god and be guaranteed that he would hear and perform that task was counter-cultural to the day. In this passage we discover a God who promised that He will hear and answer the prayers of His people. Memorize these verses, ask according to the will of God, keep His commandments, and receive.

Additional reading: Mark 11 and John 14.

- **Day 53** **John 14:12**
Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto my Father.
- **Day 54** **John 14:13**
And whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son.
- **Day 55** **John 14:14**
If ye shall ask any thing in my name, I will do it.
- **Day 56** **John 14:15**
If ye love me, keep my commandments.

Apply the Scripture:

- What do you think the phrase "Greater things shall he do" means?
- What are some things that you would like God to do in your life?
- Take a moment to pray, believing that God will answer those prayers.



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The Cross of Christ

The importance and significance of the cross of Jesus Christ as a world-changing event cannot be overstated. In one single act, Jesus effectively removed sin's hold on humanity. The crucifixion is still considered by most to be the cruelest form of capital punishment ever invented. While only a few verses depicting the crucifixion are contained in this material we encourage you to take the time to further study this selfless act to fully comprehend what Jesus Christ endured to purchase our salvation. Memorize these verses and cherish the old rugged cross.

Additional reading: Matthew 27 and John 19.

- **Day 57** **John 19:25**
Now there stood by the cross of Jesus his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalene.
- **Day 58** **John 19:30**
When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, he said, It is finished: and he bowed his head, and gave up the ghost.

Apply the Scripture:

- The gift Jesus gave us in purchasing our salvation is the greatest gift that humanity has ever known. Think of a time when you gave someone a good gift. How did they react? How did that make you feel?
- As you read this chapter, take a moment to pause and truly thank God for the sacrifice that He made for you on the cross.
- What did Jesus mean when He commanded us to take up our cross?



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The Resurrection

The power of Jesus' crucifixion is paled only by comparison to the power of His resurrection. On the third day Jesus rose again, triumphing over death and the grave, and abolishing the stranglehold that sin had on humanity. The first to see Him after His resurrection were those closest to Him. The risen Savior revealed Himself to His disciples at various times and locations, proving that His love for them was greater than their betrayal at the time of His crucifixion. Memorize these verses and glory in the power of the resurrection

Additional reading: Matthew 27-28 and John 20.

- **Day 59 John 20:1**
The first day of the week cometh Mary Magdalene early, when it was yet dark, unto the sepulchre, and seeth the stone taken away from the sepulchre.
- **Day 60 John 20:2**
Then she runneth, and cometh to Simon Peter, and to the other disciple, whom Jesus loved, and saith unto them, They have taken away the Lord out of the sepulchre, and we know not where they have laid him.
- **Day 61 John 20:4**
So they ran both together: and the other disciple did outrun Peter, and came first to the sepulchre.
- **Day 62 John 20:9**
For as yet they knew not the scripture, that he must rise again from the dead.
- **Day 63 John 20:11**
But Mary stood without at the sepulchre weeping: and as she wept, she stooped down, and looked into the sepulchre,
- **Day 64 John 20:12**
And seeth two angels in white sitting, the one at the head, and the other at the feet, where the body of Jesus had lain.
- **Day 65 John 20:13**
And they say unto her, Woman, why weepest thou? She saith unto them, Because they have taken away my Lord, and I know not where they have laid him.



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- **Day 66** **John 20:14**
And when she had thus said, she turned herself back, and saw Jesus standing, and knew not that it was Jesus.

- **Day 67** **John 20:16**
Jesus saith unto her, Mary. She turned herself, and saith unto him, Rabboni; which is to say, Master

Apply the Scripture:

- Have you ever lost something or someone you loved dearly? Imagine how those closest to Jesus felt when they lost Him. Relate that to how you have felt in times of loss.
- What elements of the resurrection narrative stand out to you the most? Why?
- What is the importance of the resurrection in relation to our salvation?



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Love Not the World

In this passage John emphasizes the importance of having right affections. He commands us not to fall in love with the world or the material things in the world. The world and everything in it is temporary and will eventually pass away. He contrasts loving the world with doing the will of God. He that fulfills the will of God invests in eternal things and will abide forever. Memorize these verses and love not the world.

Additional reading: Colossians 2 and 1 John 2.

- **Day 68** **1 John 2:15**
Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him.
- **Day 69** **1 John 2:16**
For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world.
- **Day 70** **1 John 2:17**
And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever.

Apply the Scripture:

- What does “the world” mean in this passage?
- Why do you think that if we love the world that God’s love is not in us?
- Think of and apply three ways to ensure that you are following the will of God and not loving the world.



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God is Love

Of all of the attributes of God, perhaps the most amazing is His love. His love is everlasting. It never fails. It is not easily angered, and it keeps no record of wrongs. Nothing can separate us from God's love. In fact, it is an essential element of His character, for God is love! You have value because God loves you, and He demonstrated His love for you through the Incarnation and crucifixion by becoming the payment for your sin. Memorize these verses and experience the love of God.

Additional reading: 1 John 3-4.

- **Day 71** **1 John 4:8**
He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love.
- **Day 72** **1 John 4:9**
In this was manifested the love of God toward us, because that God sent his only begotten Son into the world, that we might live through him.
- **Day 73** **1 John 4:10**
Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that he loved us, and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins.
- **Day 74** **1 John 4:11**
Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another.
- **Day 75** **1 John 4:18**
There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love.
- **Day 76** **1 John 4:19**

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The Revelation of John

In the Book of Revelation, we are given a unique, behind-the-scenes look at the end of time. While we may not fully comprehend the writings in Revelation, it is important that we understand what God has revealed about the end of time. We are moving rapidly toward the rapture of the church and the end of this world as we know it. There has never been a more critical time than now for us to study Revelation and know what to expect in the last days. Memorize these verses and receive revelation

And immediately I was in the spirit; and, behold, a throne was set in heaven, and one sat on the throne.
- **Day 78** **Rev 4:4**
And round about the throne were four and twenty seats: and upon the seats I saw four and twenty elders sitting, clothed in white raiment; and they had on their heads crowns of gold.
- **Day 79** **Rev 5:12**
Saying with a loud voice, Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honour, and glory, and blessing.
- **Day 80** **Rev 7:16**
They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat.
- **Day 81** **Rev 7:17**
For the Lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters: and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes.

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The Great White Throne of Judgment

We will all one day stand before God, face to face, and give an account for our lives. If we have not lived obediently according to His Word our names will not be written in the Book of Life. Those whose names are not found written in that book will be thrown into an eternal lake that burns with fire. The reality of Hell is not something to fear for those who obey His Word and fulfill His will. Memorize these verses; obey His Word and your name will be written in the Book of Life.

And I saw a great white throne, and him that sat on it, from whose face the earth and the heaven fled away; and there was found no place for them.
- **Day 84** **Rev 20:12**
And I saw the dead, small and great, stand before God; and the books were opened: and another book was opened, which is the book of life: and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books, according to their works.
- **Day 85** **Rev 20:13**
And the sea gave up the dead which were in it; and death and hell delivered up the dead which were in them: and they were judged every man according to their works.

This should be the ultimate goal in life, to make it to Heaven so you can spend eternity in the presence of God! Memorize these verses and make Heaven your home.

And I John saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband.
- **Day 88** **Rev 21:3**
And I heard a great voice out of heaven saying, Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God.
- **Day 89** **Rev 21:4**
And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away.
- **Day 90** **Rev 21:5**
And he that sat upon the throne said, Behold, I make all things new. And he said unto me, Write: for these words are true and faithful.
